

Religions and the Human Future

Expert Hearing

March 8, 2010 in Berlin, Germany

Introduction

The Bertelsmann Stiftung and the World Future Council Foundation invite you to participate in an Expert Hearing to reflect the relationship of religions and social change.

The world is at crossroads. Both, the social and the environmental global systems, are out of balance and call into question humanity's long term survival. The underlying causes of the degradation and destabilization processes are to a large extent rooted in the values that determine how we behave and live and what concepts and strategies for economic growth we apply in a moment of choice. The values and behavior on which the present path of world development is based must change if we want to devise possible futures within the tightening human and environmental limits. What is needed is a mental shift in order to redirect human development towards long term inclusive and sustainable progress.

The great religions are of vital importance in this field for their teachings not only influence our value systems and our attitudes towards co-operation but are also lit by a vision of tomorrow. Based on the research by Judge C.G. Weeramantry the Expert Hearing will explore what the teachings of the great world's religions are in regards to the following questions:

- a) How do they look at human development?
- b) What is their say on intragenerational justice?
- c) What is their concern for the welfare of future generations?
- d) What are their notions of men-nature relationships and trusteeship of earth resources?
- e) What kind of life-styles do they envisage?
- f) To what extent do the great religions make room for non-believers and different faiths?

Towards this end the organizers are planning to convene a select group of representatives and experts of the great world religions (confined to Hinduism, Judaism, Buddhism, Christianity and Islam) for an open ended and future oriented discussion. Based on the deliberations the organizers are planning to highlight the shared responsibility of the worlds religions for a more inclusive and sustainable development of our world and possible ways to contribute from the religions towards profound social change.
